RHODENZA 2023 GARDENS

Wednesday 25 October South Taranaki

Cairnhill Garden - June and Colin Lees - Toko

The well planted driveway introduces this mature country garden. June and Colin have developed it over the last 56 years and they are still trying something new. Their dedication has led to a profusion of colour at every turn. A series of garden rooms highlight special plants with a range of edging plants defining the layered borders.

Puketarata Garden - Jennifer and Ken Horner - Ngawhini Rd

Spectacular views are a feature of this hilltop property which is sophisticated and well planted. The spacious garden merges with its planted hillside and the native bush. The house is well integrated into the garden and a parterre and unusual sculptures add interest.

Hollard Gardens - Taranaki Regional Council - Manaia Rd

Established by Bernie Hollard in 1927 this 4.5 ha garden features an immense international range of plants as well as many rare and unusual natives. Even the most experienced gardener can discover something new here. Bernie raised one of New Zealand's most successful rhododendrons; look out for the early flowering red, R. 'Kaponga'.

Gravetye - John and Jenny Pease - Manawapou Road

Gravetye is different! This dramatic garden has been carefully designed by the owners over the last 17 years and they have adapted ideas from their

extensive travels into a New Zealand setting. Wide avenues edged by clipped hedges radiate from the house and feature different plantings and unusual geometric features which focus the eye. This garden will get you talking!

Oakley Garden – Jenny and Guy Oakley – Lower Normanby Rd

If ever there was a garden stalwart, Jenny is it. Supported by Guy, she has opened her garden for the Taranaki Garden Festival since its inception in 1987. Mature trees give this large family garden protection from the salt laden southerly winds and allow it to thrive. The spectacular Xeronema, the Poor Knights Lily, was one of their favourite plants from the early days. Other features include brick walls and pillars, cottage style plantings, early flowering roses, vegetable potager and Jenny's iconic hanging baskets.

Thursday 26 October Pukeiti and Hurworth

Pukeiti – Taranaki Regional Council – Carrington Rd

An NZGT 'Garden of National Significance'. Long the mecca of rhododendron lovers in New Zealand, Pukeiti is the jewel in the crown of Taranaki gardens. Today Pukeiti Rhododendron Trust has a partnership with the Taranaki Regional Council which now owns the garden. The extensive property is 72 years old and is a well-established, mature garden. Enjoy more than 10,000 rhododendrons and azaleas in a unique setting of the rain forest and mountain streams. For many the 'bush' is the main attraction.

Drifts of primulas, hostas, bluebells and the world renowned vireya collection complete the magic that is Pukeiti.

Hurworth Country Garden – Jan and Graeme Worthington – Carrington Rd

This graceful country garden, packed with flourishing beds, borders and mass plantings has been developed around a beautifully restored 1910 villa. Special features include an interestingly designed summer house, extensive lawns, established native and exotic trees, formal and woodland plantings, brick and stone walls and a fountain. Featured in NZ House and Garden magazine.

Saxton Sanctuary - Kim and Owen Howell - Saxton Rd

Members will be pleased to see this garden open again. This 40 year-old woodland property is the legacy of renowned Taranaki plantsman, Les Taylor. His vision is now very evident as the garden has matured and Kim and Owen have done a great job in making the most of the early plantings. Set among an extensive range of established trees, colour is provided by rhododendrons, azaleas, astilbes and irises. Hostas flourish beside the pond alongside burgundy and red maples.

Friday 27 October North Taranaki

Tawa-Glen Nursery - Ian and Wendy Swan - Richmond Rd, Brixton

If you think rhododendrons are going out of fashion you should talk to Ian

and Wendy. Their thriving immaculately cared for nursery produces a range of rhododendrons and other plants for independent garden centres and they sell all they can produce. The nursery is strictly wholesale but plants can be bought at the nearby Big Jims Garden Centre.

Riverlea - Ann and Vince Naus - Corbett Road

Now retired from their garden centre, Ann and Vince both have a great love of plants, which shows in this extensive garden. Planting ranges from a formal Long Walk with its herbaceous borders to a cottage garden around the house and an interesting, wilder native area beside the Mangaoraka Stream.

Tikorangi The Jury Garden- Mark and Abbie Jury Otaraoa Rd

The unique rimu avenue dating back 150 years sets the standard for this historic garden. Mark and Abbie took over from Mark's father, Felix in the 1980s and the garden continues to develop. The dramatic Summer Garden opened in 2020 and the Wild North Garden is now open. Mark and Abbie believe a garden should be sustainable, environmentally sound and aesthetically pleasing and they have achieved this to a remarkable degree. This garden is no longer open during the Taranaki Garden Festival so this is a good chance to see one of Taranaki's most significant gardens.
